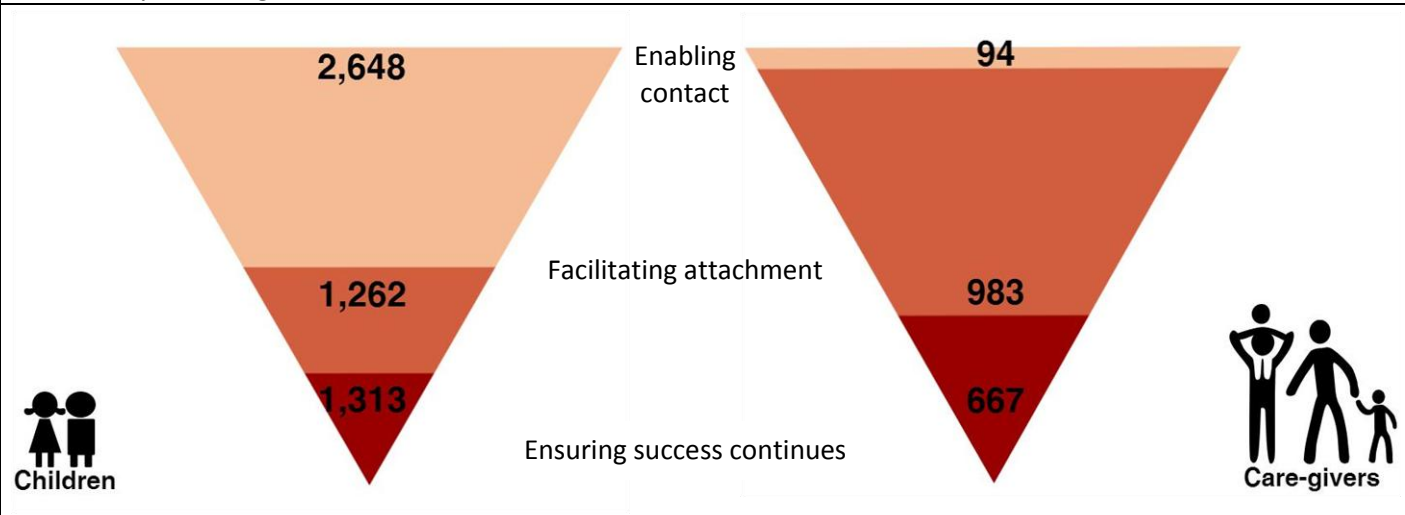


**Strategic priority 1**

We worked with **5,286** street children and family members under SP1:  
providing children with a safe and real alternative to life on the streets

<p><b>Returning home: Helping street and vulnerable children into family based care, where possible their own family first.</b></p> <p>Returning home activities reflect Retrak’s model. Below are the numbers of street children served in outreach, supported during placement and followed-up; and their care-givers and other children in same households have also been supported during the placement and follow-up.</p>	<p><b>Creating safe spaces and (re)building childhood: Providing safe spaces for children in normal, disaster and conflict situations.</b></p> <p>The following graph presents the number of children participating in different services offered to them in Retrak transitional centres.</p> <p>Overall, in 2014, Retrak served 2,293 street children in the centres, which is 25% over the yearly target.</p>																											
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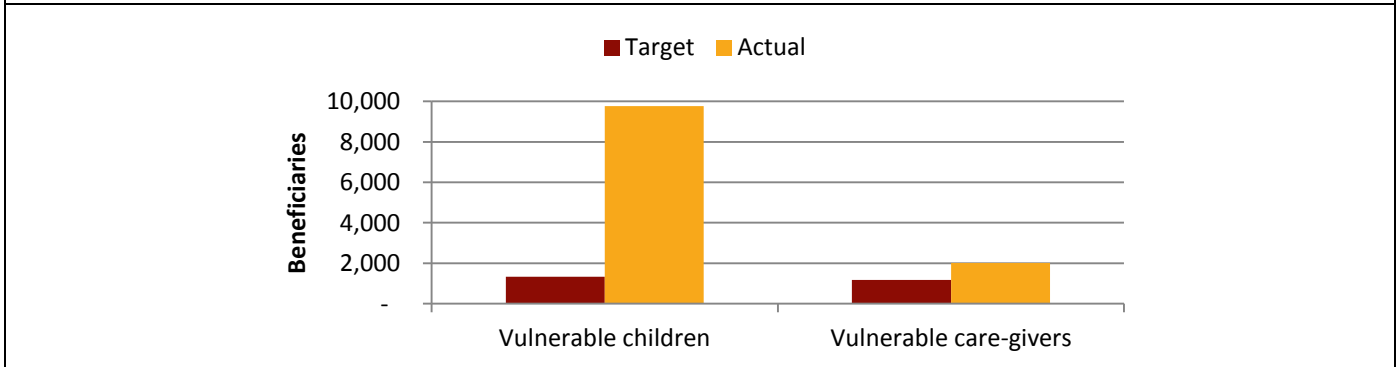
The graph below shows the number of children and care-givers worked with at each stage of Retrak’s model for successfully returning street children to safe homes in families and communities.



### Strategic priority 2

We worked with **11,771** children, family and community members under SP2: promoting family preservation and working with communities to prevent highly vulnerable children coming to the street

**Preserving families and nurturing community:**  
**Equipping families with coping mechanisms to build their resilience and enable them to stay together.**  
 Prevention work in Hossana, Ethiopia reached over 7 times more vulnerable children last year than set out in the target, this was through extra community education activities. The graph below shows the beneficiaries in Ethiopia and in Malawi.

### Strategic priority 3

We worked with **205** practitioners under SP3: informing research, advocacy and collaboration to change policy and practice in favour of children

#### Speaking out to influence policy and practice:

**Giving street children a voice and speaking up on their behalf by listening to them and creating forums in which their voice can be heard.**

We want children’s voices to be heard on the global forum, so we engage with stakeholders at a local, regional, national and international level to share what we are hearing and learning from our beneficiaries. The word clouds show who we engaged with and the topics we discussed with them.

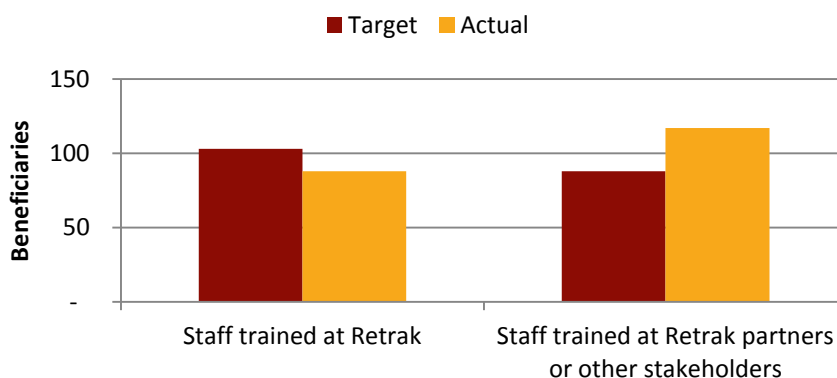

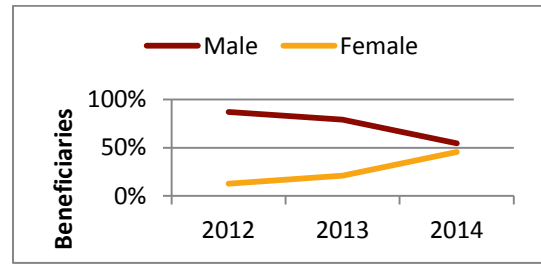
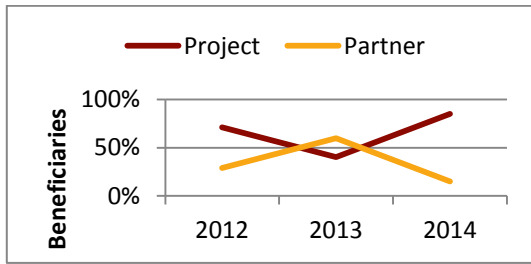
#### Raising standards:

**Improving knowledge and understanding based on results in order to raise standards when working with street and highly vulnerable children**

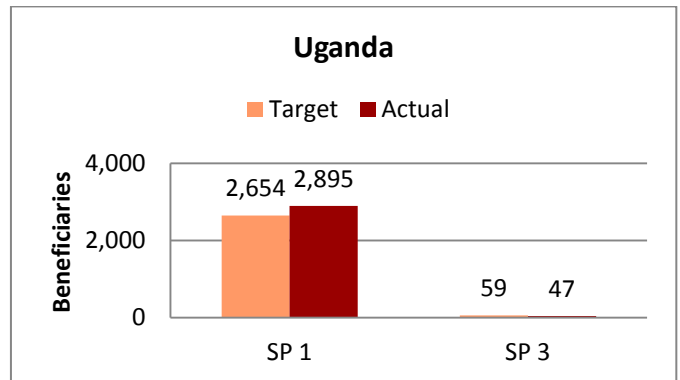
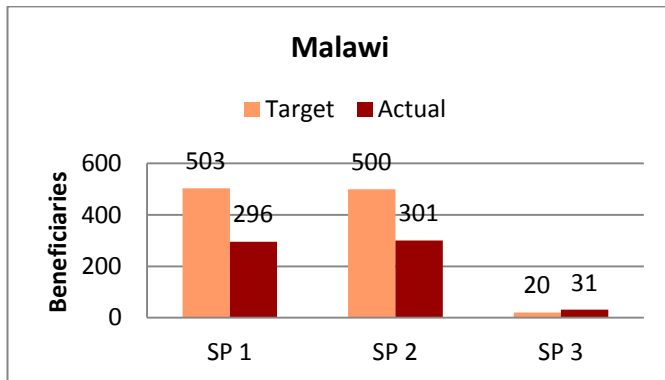
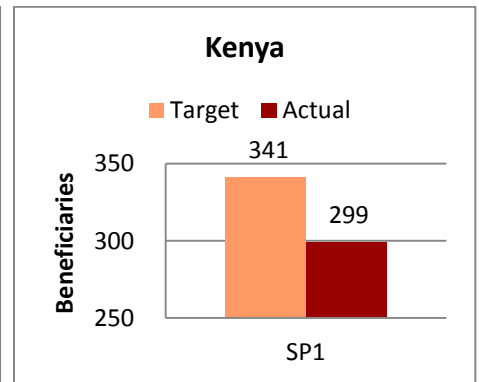
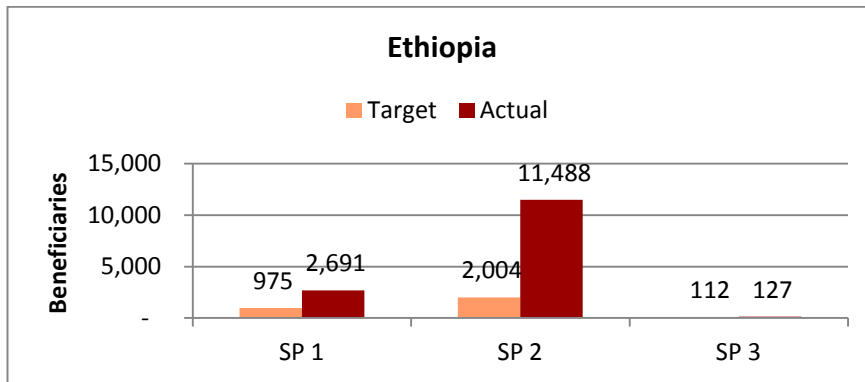
We have enabled our own staff and those at our partners to access training on reintegration SOPs, M&E, parenting skills, youth justice, child protection, fundraising and savings and loans.
